Mid and Mock Exams

The Mid Year and Mock Exams were also held in the week commencing 15th January for all students.

The staff were very disappointed with the performance of the students and have therefore agreed to hold a second Exam Week.

Please encourage your child to revise thoroughly at home and manage their time effectively for these exams. Many of the KS3 students failed to take their examinations seriously and displayed a poor attitude with many careless written errors. These tests are highly important as it gives an indication to the teachers as to how your child is progressing academically and whether they need extra intervention to help them further.

The Year 10 students will be having their Mock Exam in the week commencing 26th Feb and the rest of the school will be having their examinations in the following week: 5th March.

Work Experience

It is a rite of passage in the lives of teenagers across the country: the day they leave behind the security of the classroom to dip their toes into an unfamiliar world in the time-honoured custom of work experience.

This term, from the 5th till the 16th March our Year 10 students will be heading into workplaces, ranging from pharmacys to hair salons, primary schools to nurserys. Some will be excited at the prospect of sampling life beyond school, while others will be nervous at stepping out of their comfort zone.

But it does not have to be an ordeal. Work experience can provide an insight into a different environment. It can help these girls' decide if a career is for them. And it can be very handy when it comes to getting a job.

Although most students have a firm career plan but for those still in the dark, a placement can be useful. It is helping them discover the types of careers that are out there and the pathways to get there, so they can think about what they want to do and the qualifications they will need.

A good placement makes students more realistic and able to make informed career choices. It also provides concrete evidence of interest in a particular career to both university admissions officers and future employers. Students grow up and become noticeably more mature, it helps them see what they have to do and think about the long term.

Students - How to get the most out of work experience

- Act professionally. Turn up on time, follow the dress code if there is one, stick to prescribed breaks, do not complain of being bored and expect to stay until the end of the working day.
- Be realistic about what you will be doing. There is likely to be an amount of routine involved and not all of the tasks you do will be scintillating.
- If you finish one task, instead of waiting until you are given another one, ask what else you can do.
- Ask employees how they got where they are and what qualifications they needed.
- If you have any concerns, talk to your supervisor, or contact the school or placement organiser to sort it out.

We wish all our Year 10 students the very best in their chosen work placements and we look forward to hearing their success stories when they come back!
